<p>where everyone feels happy and safe</p>	<p>and support them to make the right choices</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Have a behaviour policy which creates a safe and caring environment for everyone ● Make sure that all staff, pupils and parents/carers know what behaviour is expected ● Ensure all children and staff treat each other with respect ● Deal promptly with any incidents of negative behaviour fairly and thoroughly and when appropriate, contact parents/carers to keep them informed ● Help pupils to understand why some people may behave differently and need different support, for example, due to neurodiversity. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Give praise at home for good behaviour and attitude at school ● Work with the school to find solutions in cases of unacceptable behaviour or long-term behavioural difficulties ● Always behave in an appropriate fashion when in and around the school ● Treat all staff and fellow parents with respect ● Refrain from approaching other parents and children to resolve an issue, trusting staff to do so on their behalf ● Ensure their child wears full uniform at all times including PE kit ● Ensure their child does not wear make-up including nail varnish, nail extensions and that parents are aware that school will remove these where it is safe to do so. ● Refrain from allowing their child to wear hooped ear rings and/or other non-religious related jewellery for safety reasons. ● Refrain from discussing other children's behaviour with other parents - behaviour is communication and staff are trained to support children who are displaying negative behaviours. ● Model empathy and understanding towards behaviours that may be different from the majority, for example, due to neurodiversity. 	<p>values</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Follow our school rules ● Show respect to all adults and children within the school community ● Listen to others ● Engage in restorative conversations to resolve conflict ● Be truthful and take responsibility ● Speak to school staff if they have any worries about negative behaviour that is affecting them ● Always wear full school uniform ● Wear full PE kit on the necessary day and not branded kits ● Take good care of the school equipment, environment and living things

<p>Communication Good communication between home and school is essential to make sure that pupils get the support they need.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Be open and welcoming at all times and offer opportunities for parents to become involved in school life ● Invite parents/carers to attend events that celebrate children's success and achievements ● Keep parents/carers informed about school activities through newsletters and the website ● Let parents/carers know early on if there are any concerns or problems that affect their child's learning or behaviour ● Make sure that parents/carers are informed about what their child is learning and the progress they are making ● Listen to parents' concerns and resolve any concerns promptly 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Read the school's weekly newsletter ● Sign up to the school's texting and payment app ● Tell school about anything that may affect their child's learning or behaviour ● Attend achievement assemblies, parent workshops and parent-teacher meetings ● Raise any concerns promptly and directly with the school starting with the class teacher ● Ensure all monies owed to the school are paid in full and on time 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Take letters, notes and reports from school home and give them to their parents/carers ● Talk with parents/carers and teachers about any worries they have
